# Strategies for Addressing Homelessness in Los Angeles

Our events bring together leading experts with Foundation donors to learn and grow together as a community and to become more strategic, effective philanthropists.

We recently held an inspiring event about addressing homelessness in Los Angeles. The event was held at the home of Foundation Trustee **Keenan Wolens** and his wife, **Orna**, in Beverly Hills, and a panel of leading experts discussed effective ways to address this challenging issue.

The panelists explained that people experiencing homelessness struggle with an array of issues. For decades, Los Angeles has grappled with creating enough supportive housing services. Due to an increased focus by the Los Angeles community, more affordable housing initiatives have been implemented. As a result, according to the Los Angeles Homeless Services Authority (LAHSA), in the past year, the number of individuals experiencing homelessness has decreased by approximately 4 percent from 55,048 to 52,765.

Though this is a crucial step in the right direction, substantial work remains. Many L.A. organizations, including those represented at our event, have worked to address this issue.

The event was moderated by one of The Foundation's Program Officers, Warren Fong, and featured Rabbi Noah Farkas of Valley Beth Shalom and LAHSA, Andrea Iloulian of the Conrad N. Hilton Foundation, Estela Lopez of the LA Downtown Industrial District Business Improvement District, and Tommy Newman of United Way of Greater Los Angeles. The speakers highlighted several notable points, including:

- About 30 percent of people experiencing chronic homelessness have severe mental health issues.
- About 70 percent of people experiencing homelessness do so because of housing unaffordability.
- Citywide, Los Angeles has a vacancy rate of approximately 2 percent and a massive housing shortage.

"Oftentimes, we think of homelessness as this monolithic issue, where all individuals have the same needs," explained Fong. "But a senior citizen who can't find affordable housing is different from someone with significant mental and physical health issues

who has been homeless for years. Understanding these nuances and how best to address them is critical to formulating strategies to address homelessness. Our panel of experts represents organizations on the frontline of this issue, who deeply understand it and are implementing effective programs to alleviate it, which is vitally important to The Foundation and our family of donors."
